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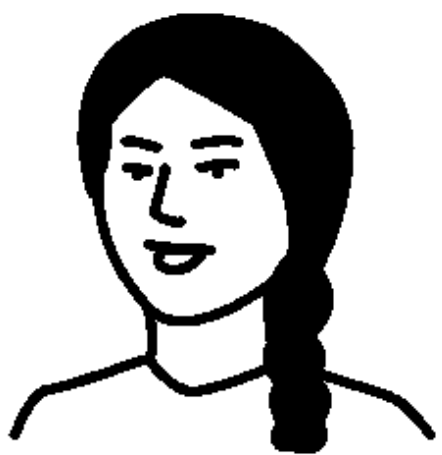
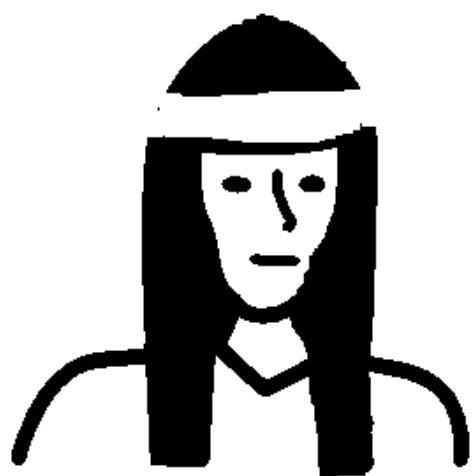

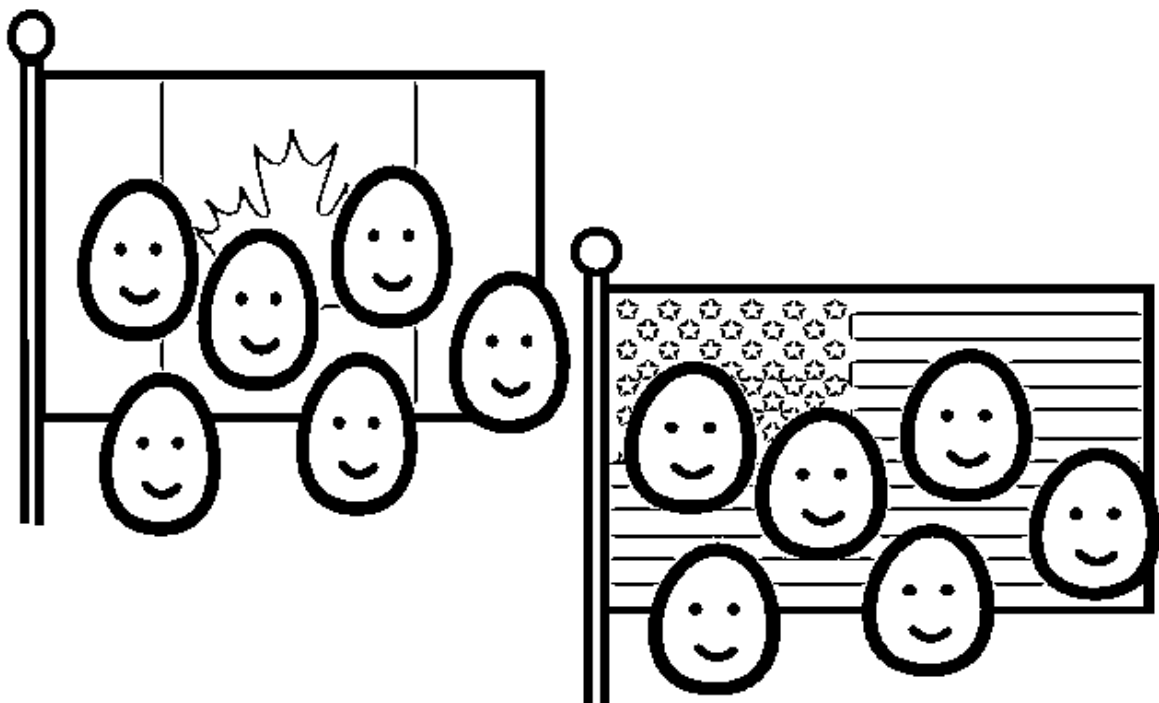

They have lived on the land we call Canada and the United States for many generations, long before **settlers** came to live here.



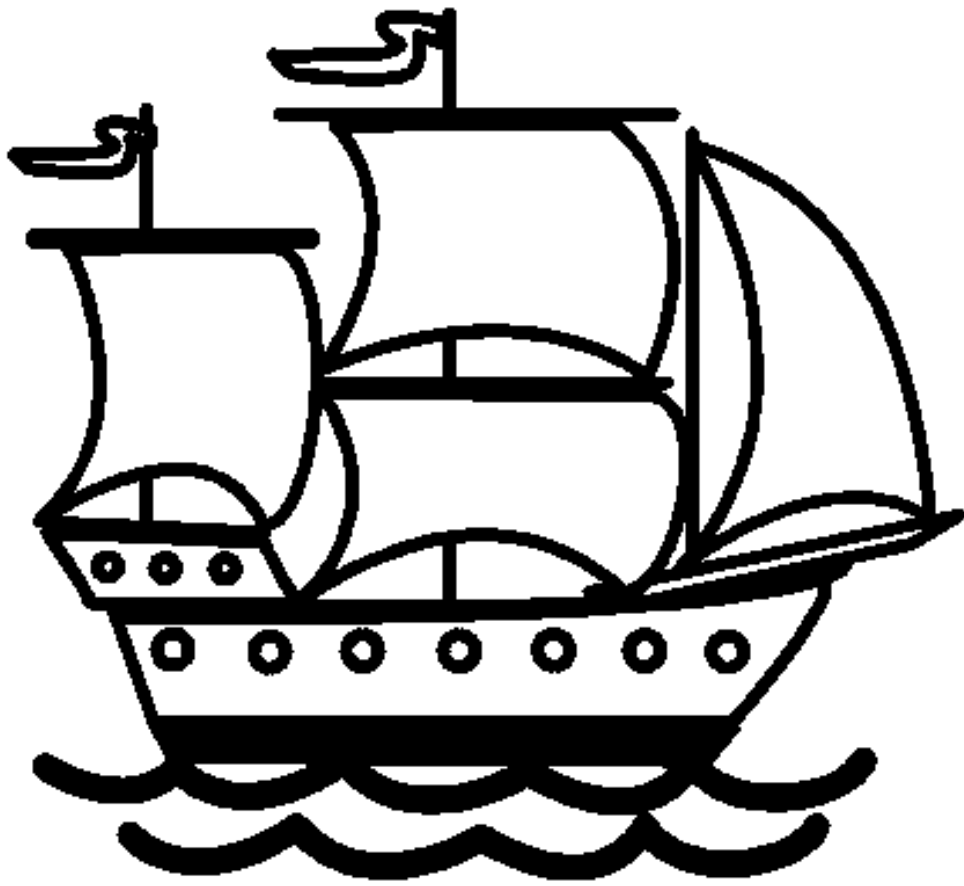
Many **Indigenous** nations believe that people need to have strong connections to the land and respectful relationships with all living things.



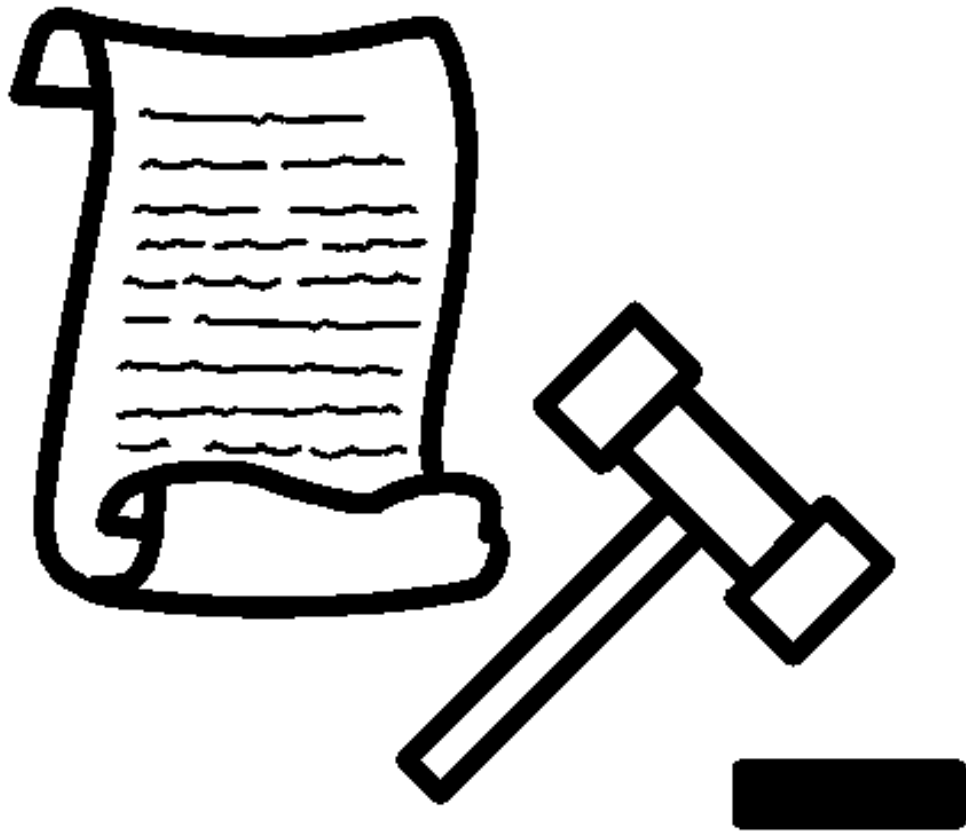
Family, home,

When **European** settlers arrived, Indigenous people greeted them and helped them live on the land.

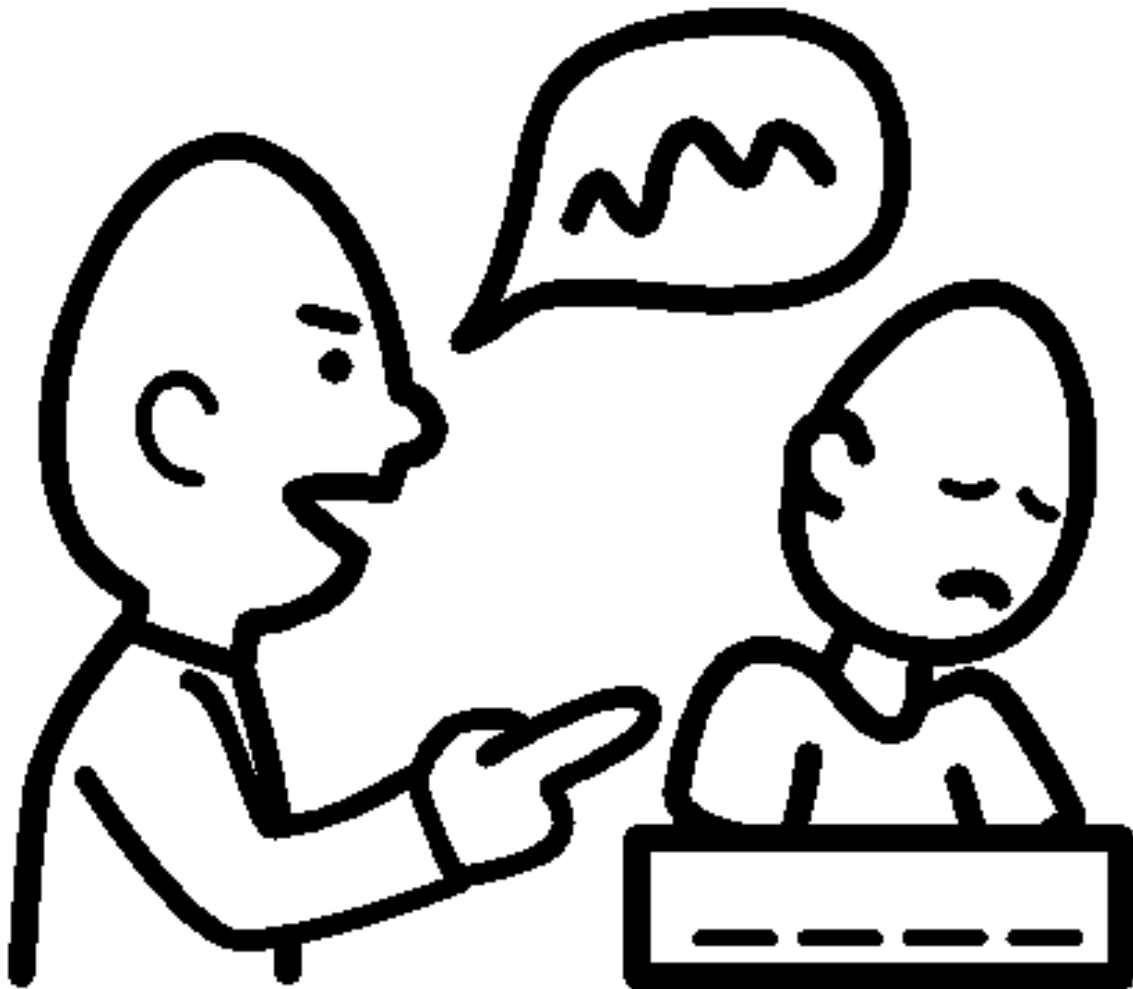


But after a while the European settlers took their land away and took control of their lives.

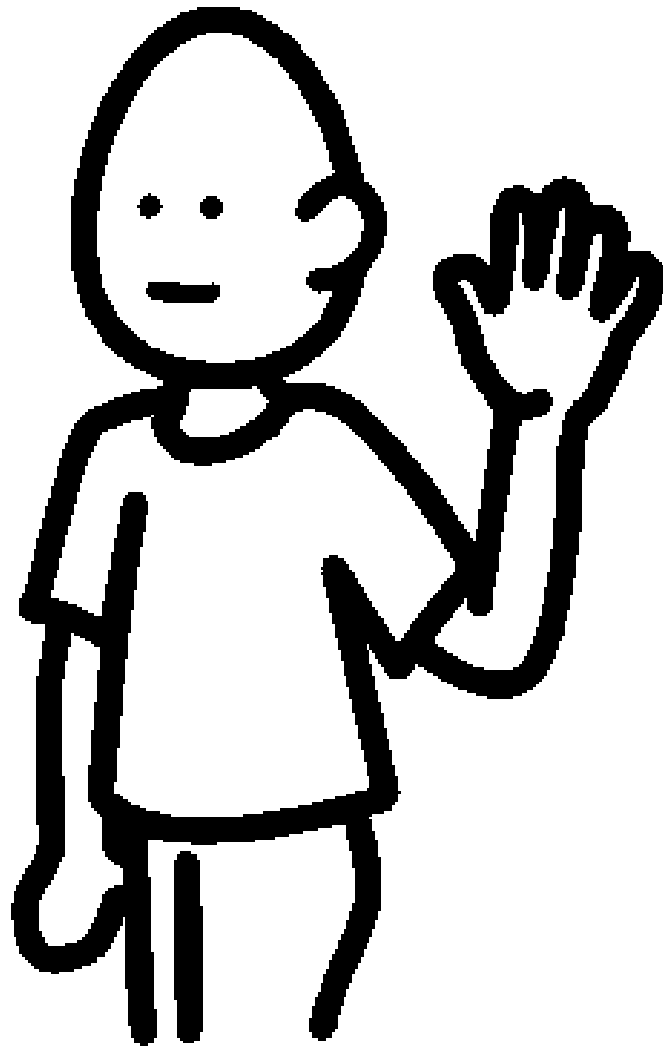




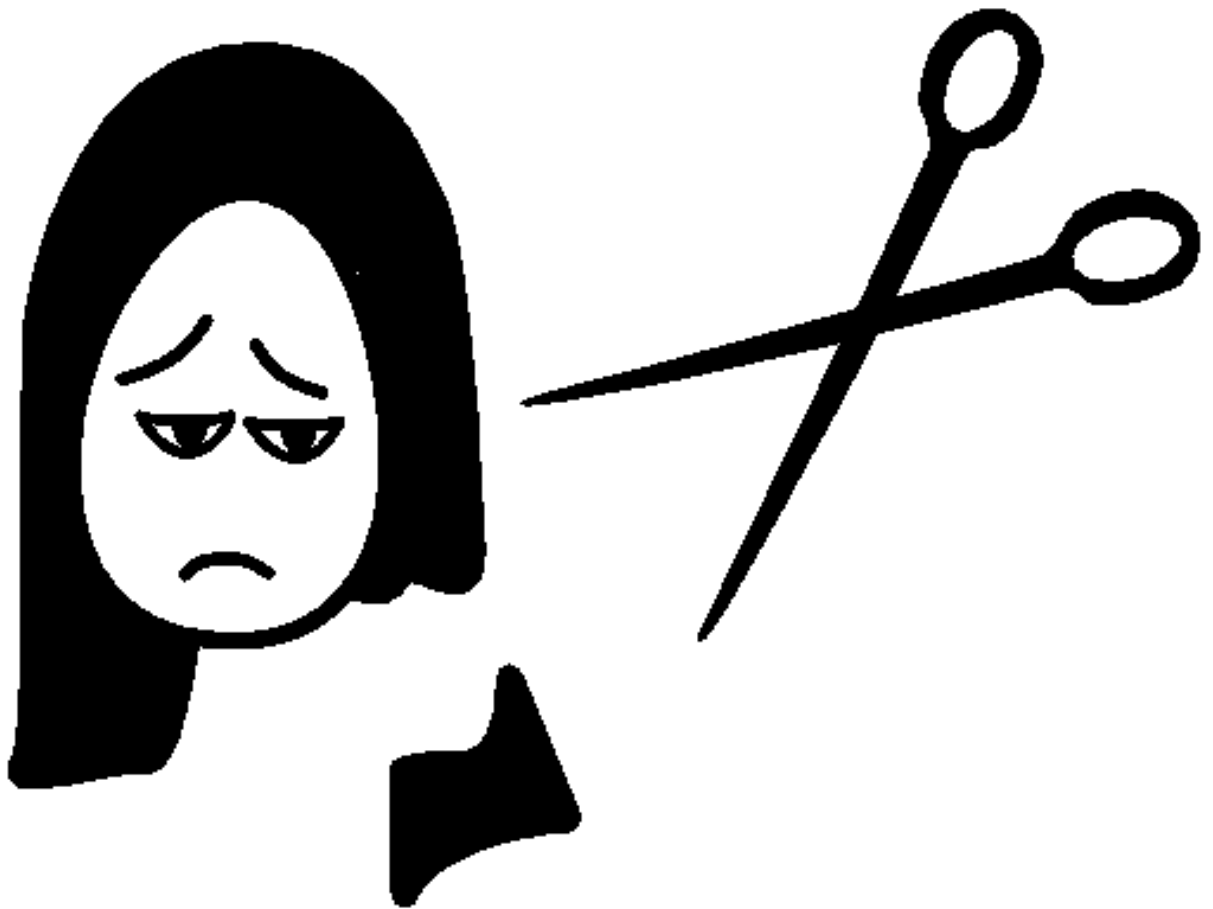
European settlers

people “Indians.”



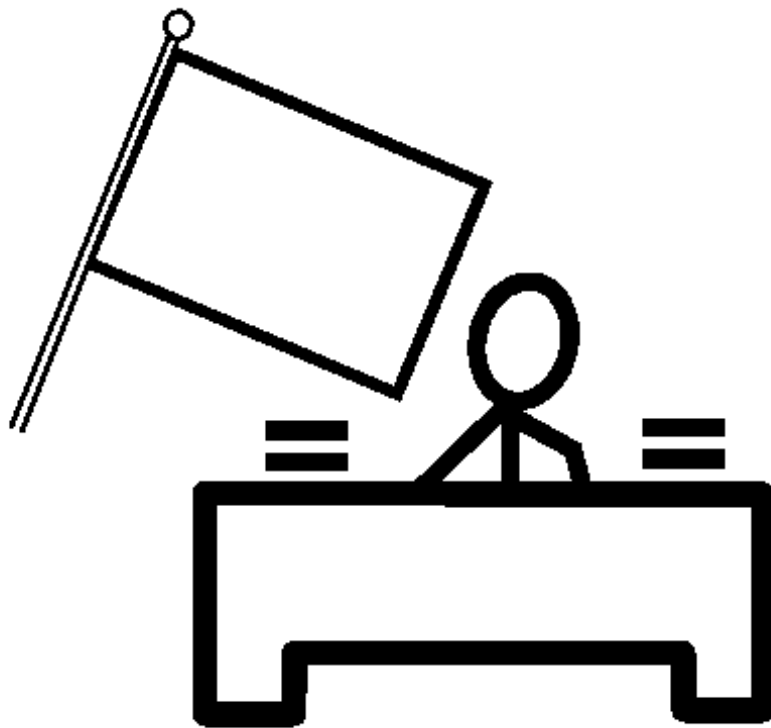
They believed that

were **inferior**.



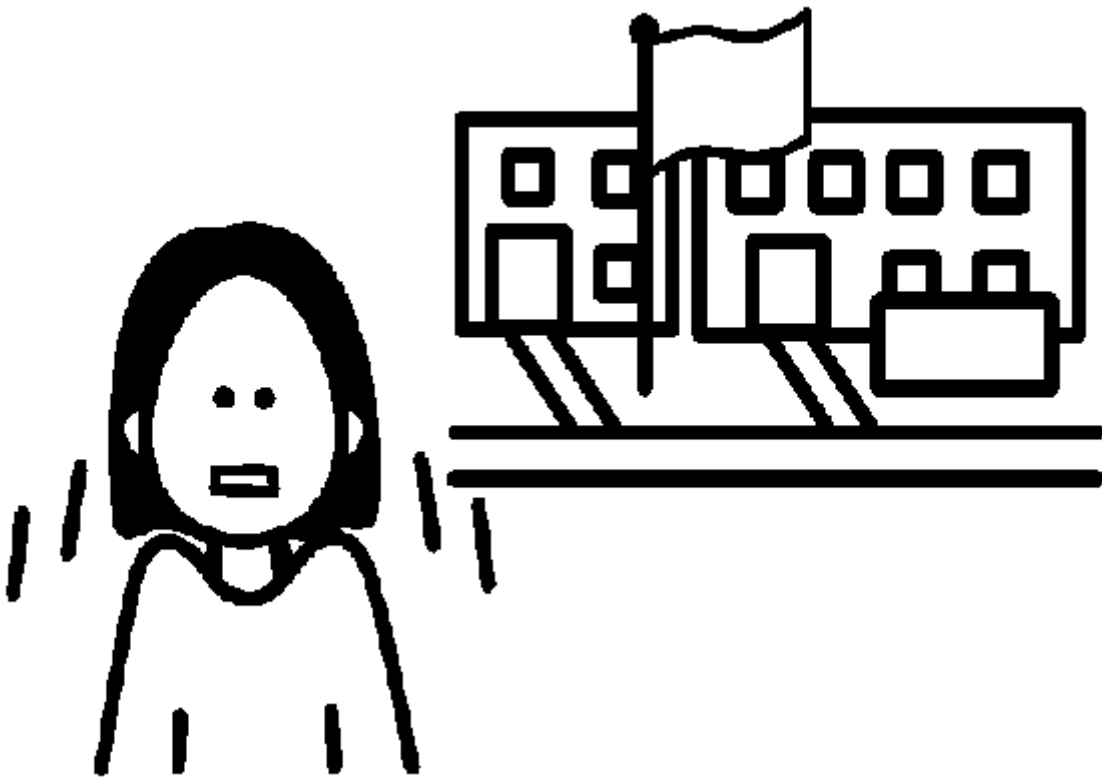
They began to think of

become less Indian.



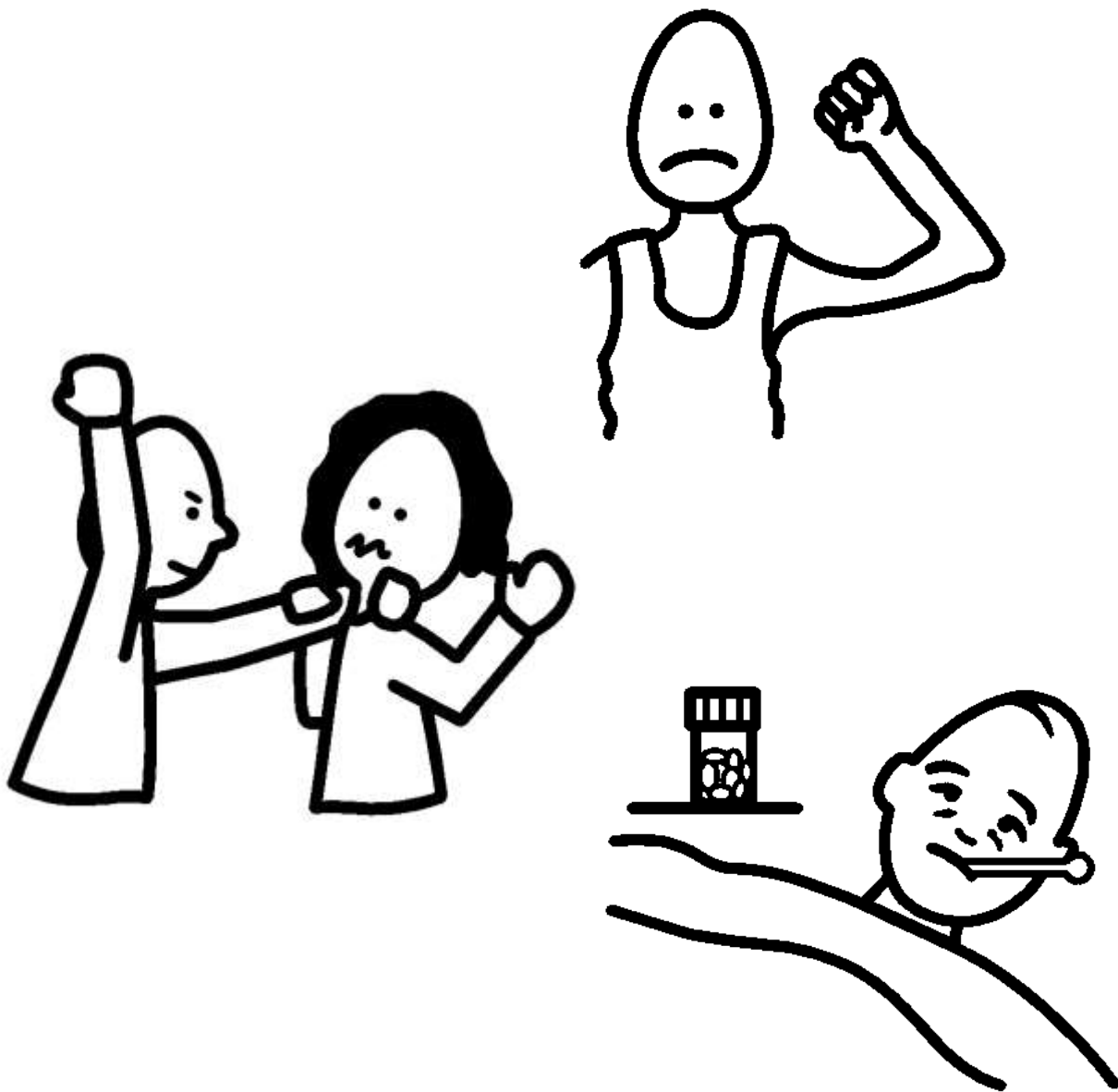
Indigenous children

**residential school.**



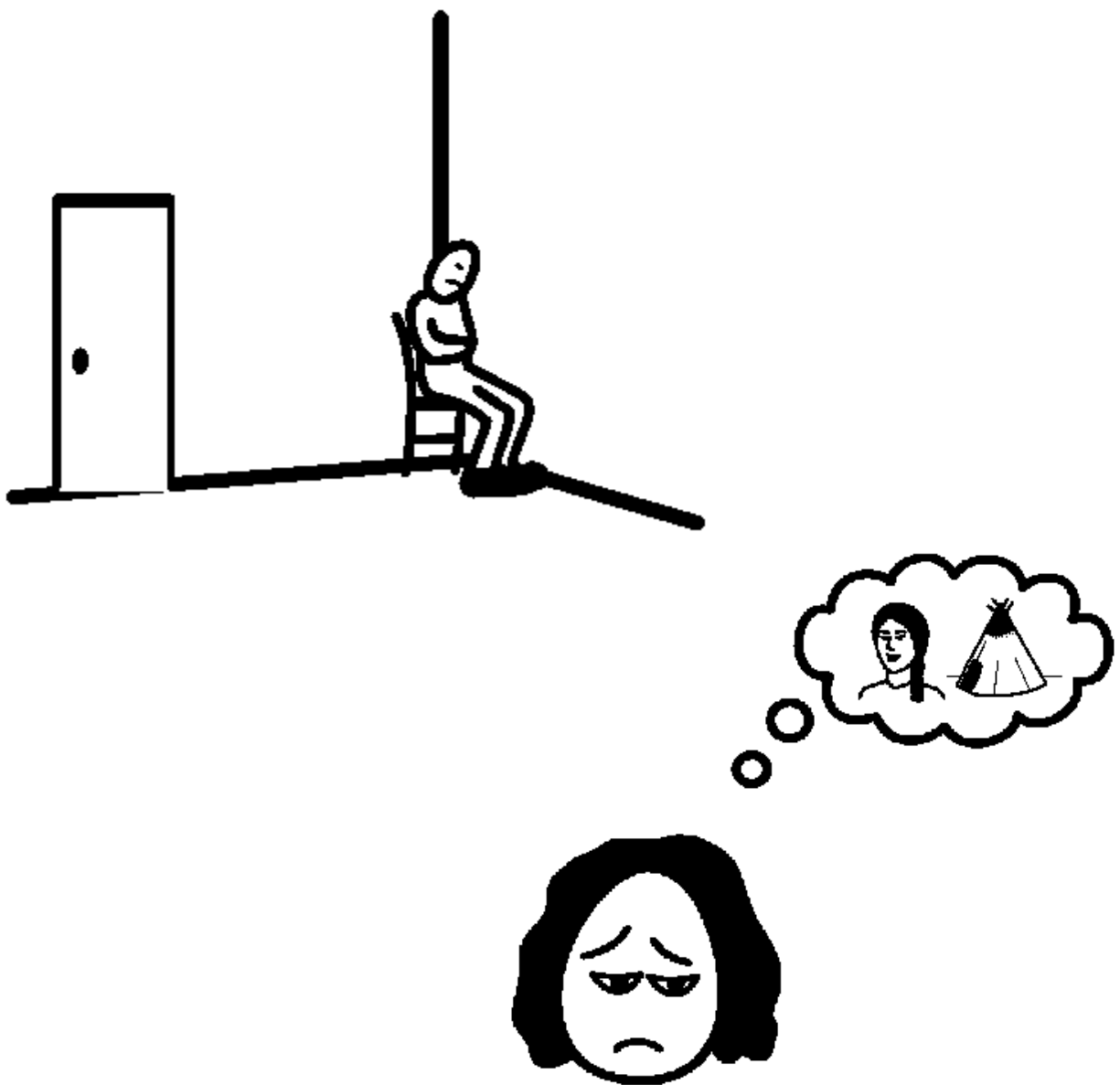
Indigenous children

a long time.

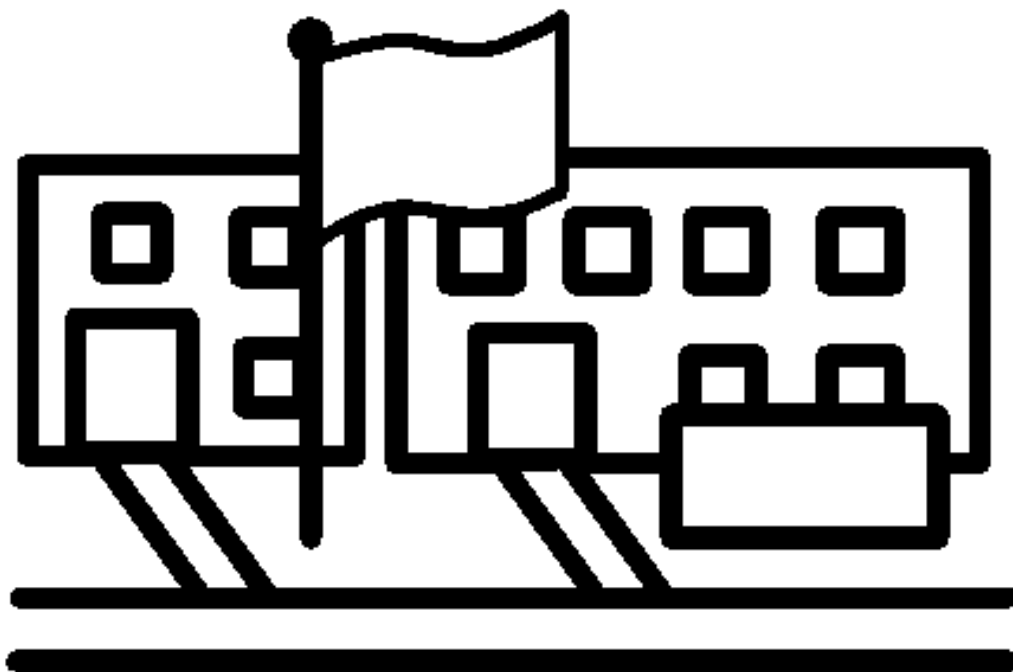




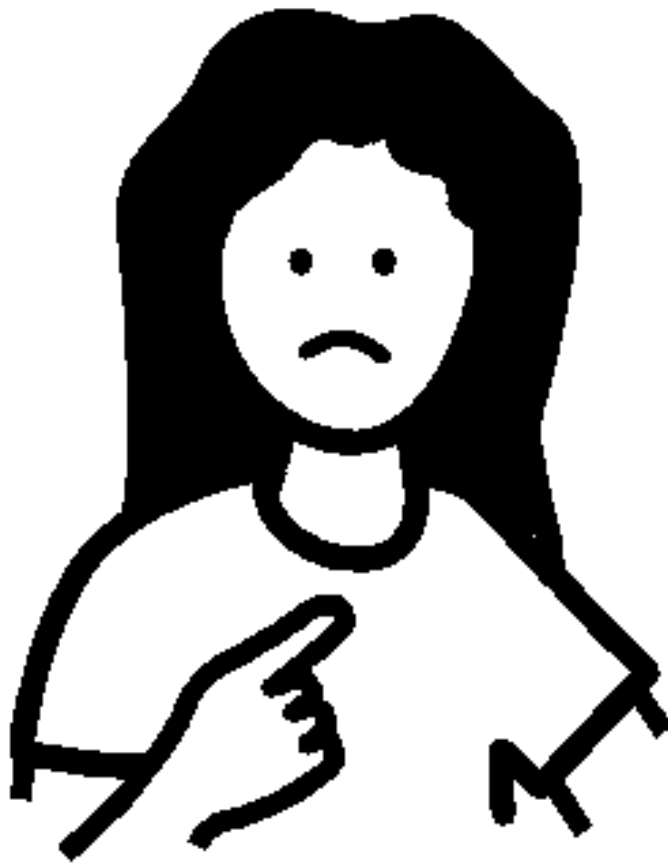
They weren't allowed to

cultural **traditions**.



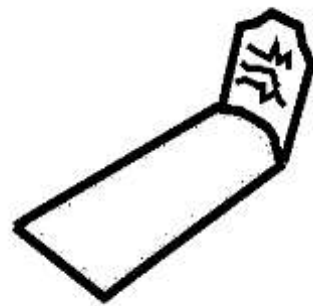
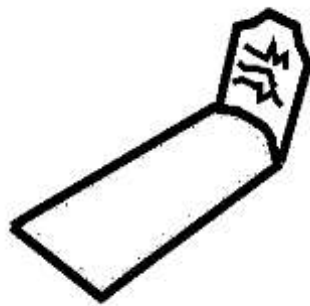
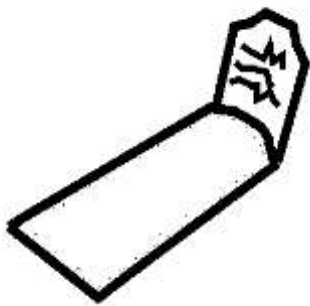
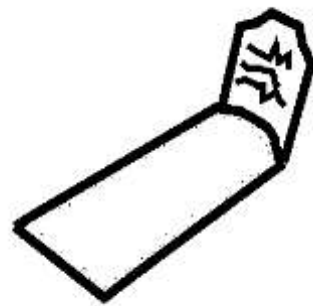
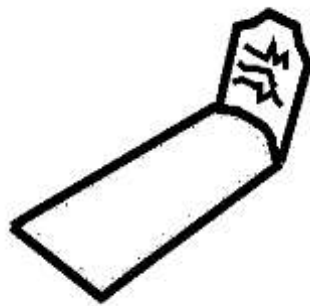
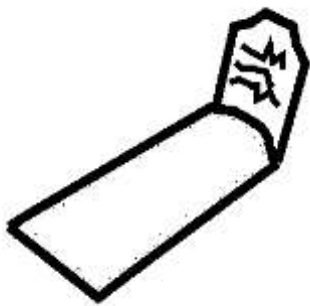
Residential schools in Canada were open for 165 years. The last residential school in Canada closed in 1996.



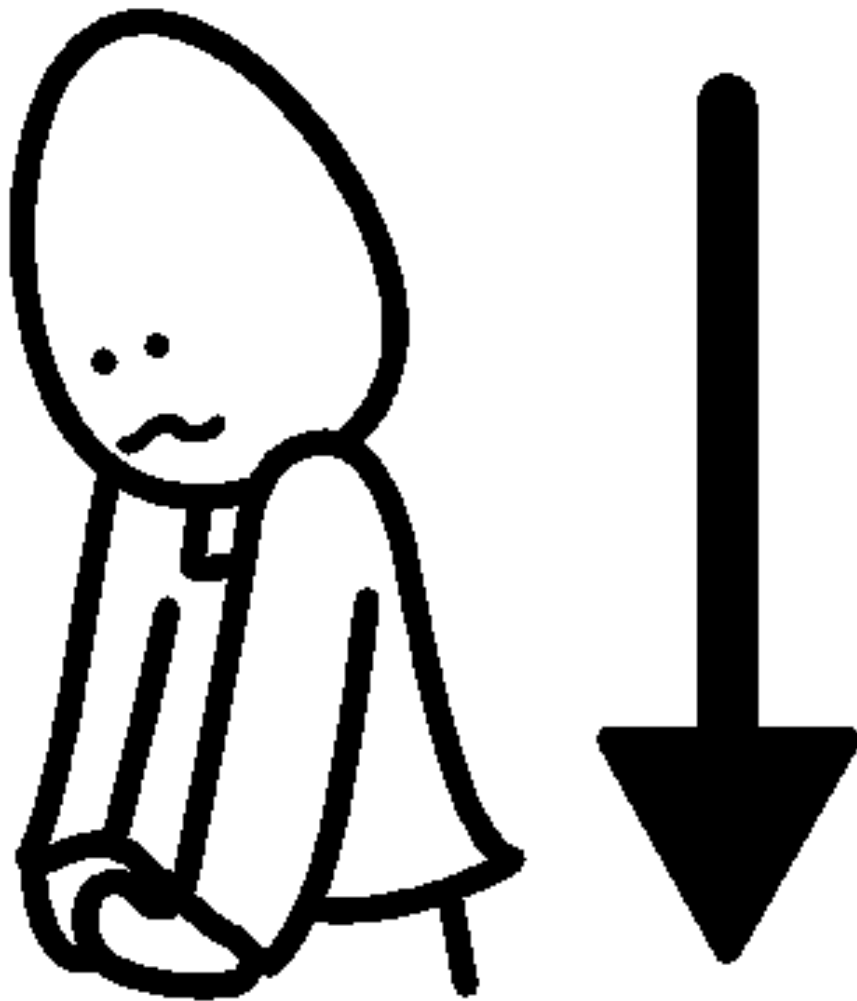
Residential schools

Many Indigenous children died at residential school.



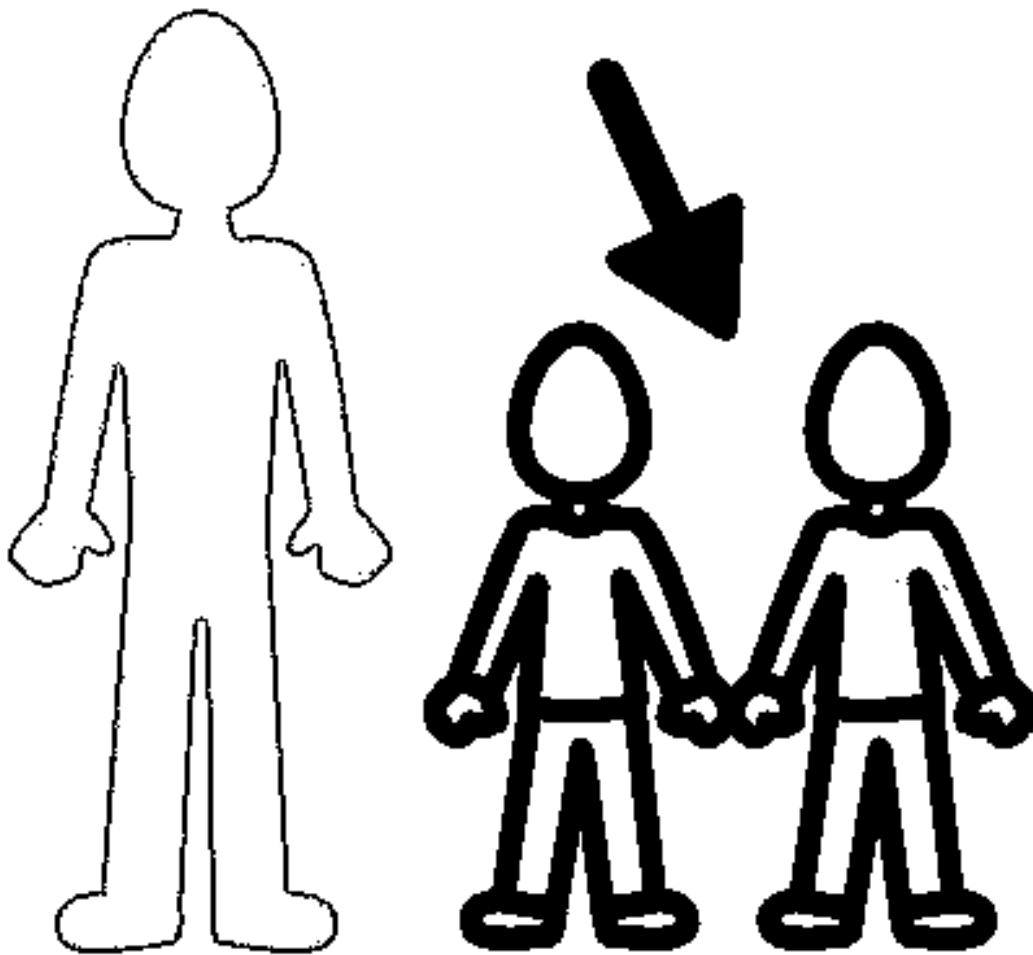
**Survivors** of

were never the same.



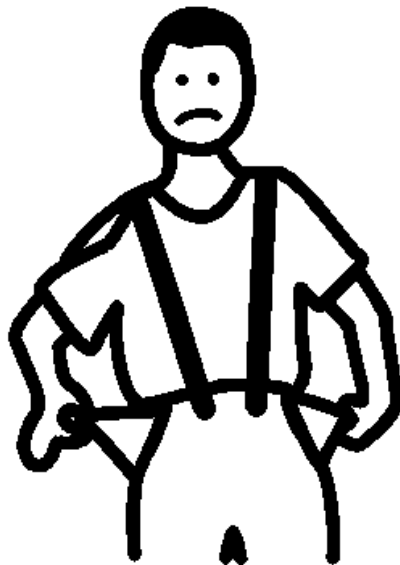
They lost their **identity**.



Children of residential school survivors have also been impacted by this **trauma**.

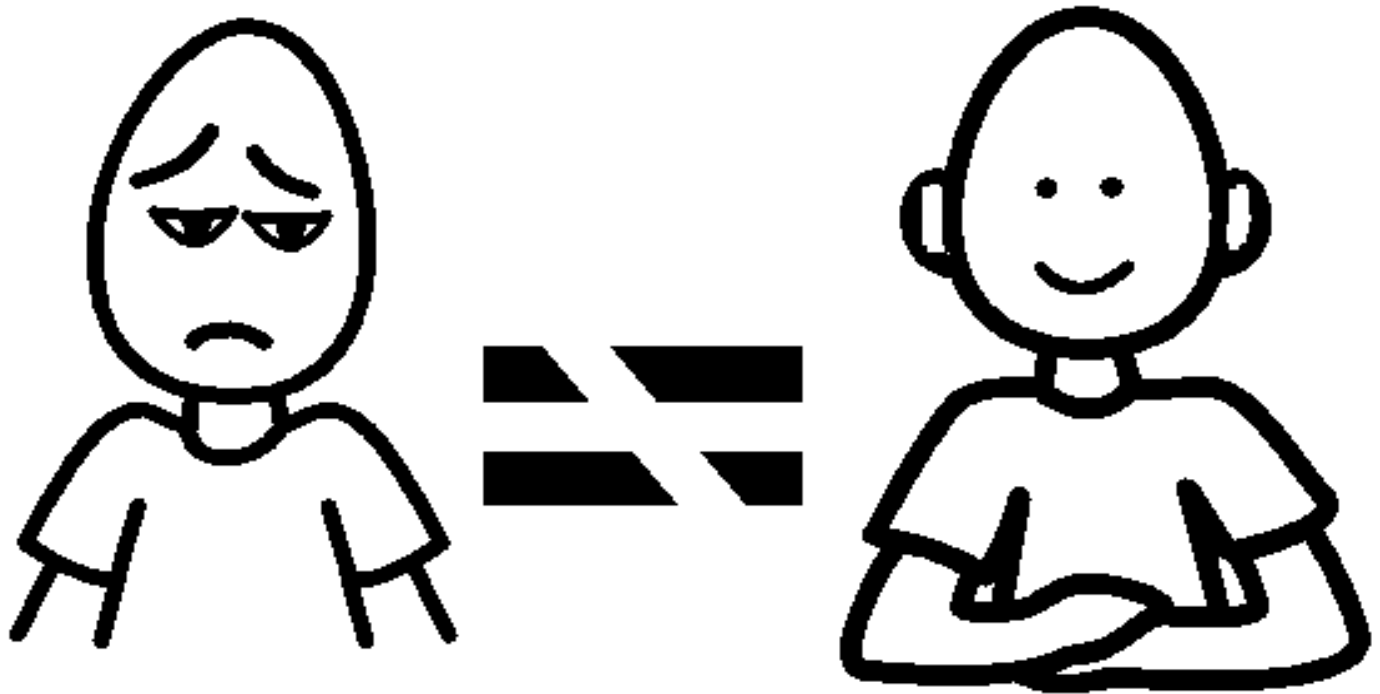


Today, some

has happened.

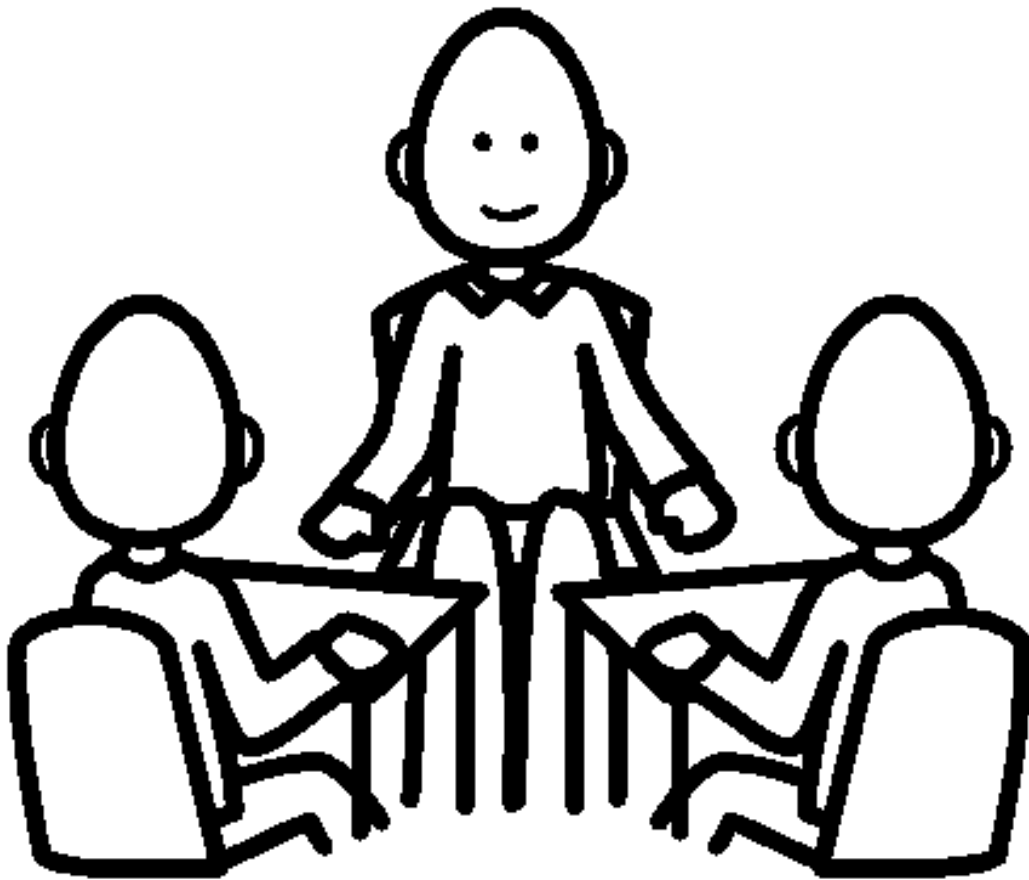




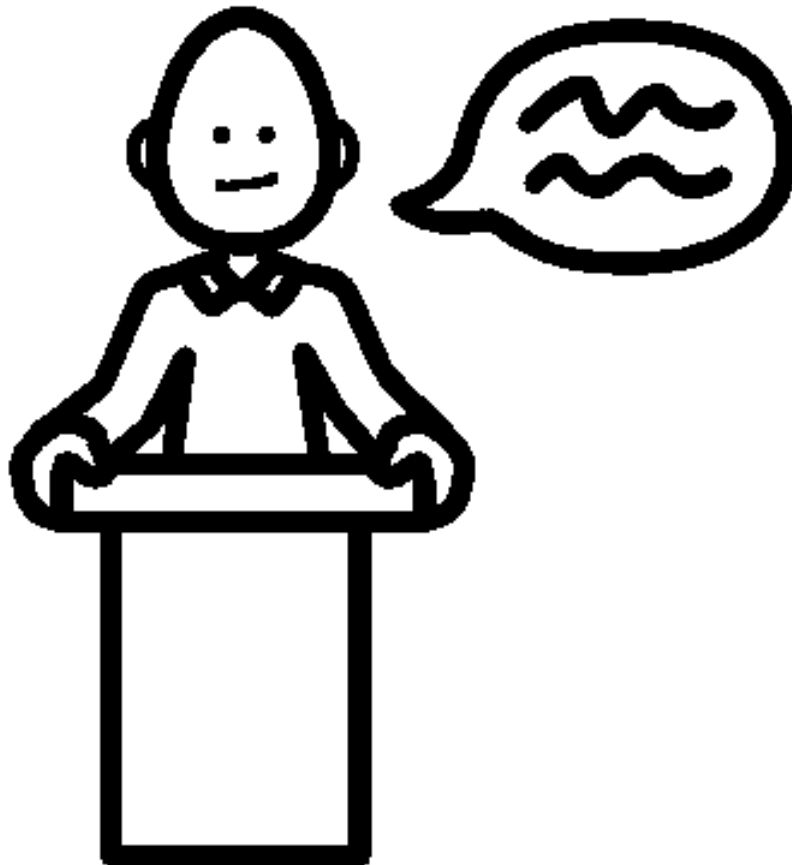
Indigenous people

**racism** in Canada.



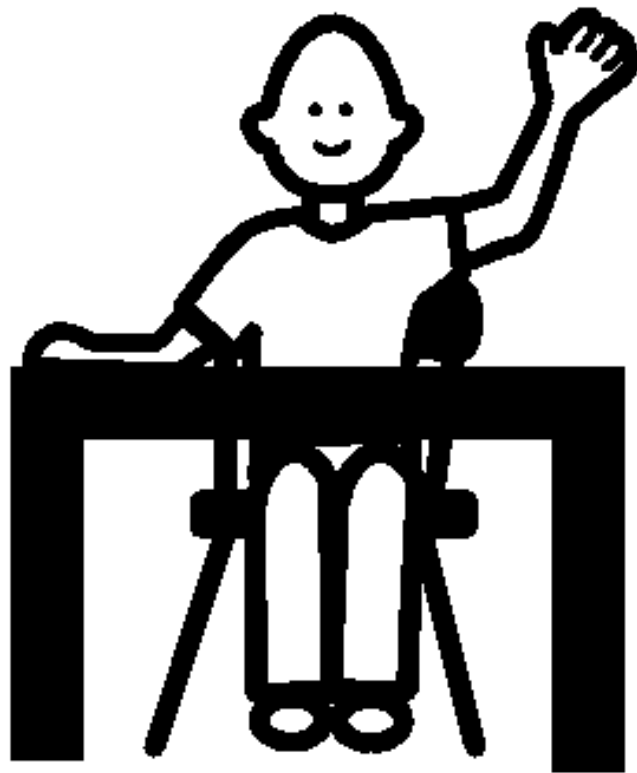
We are starting to learn

with others.



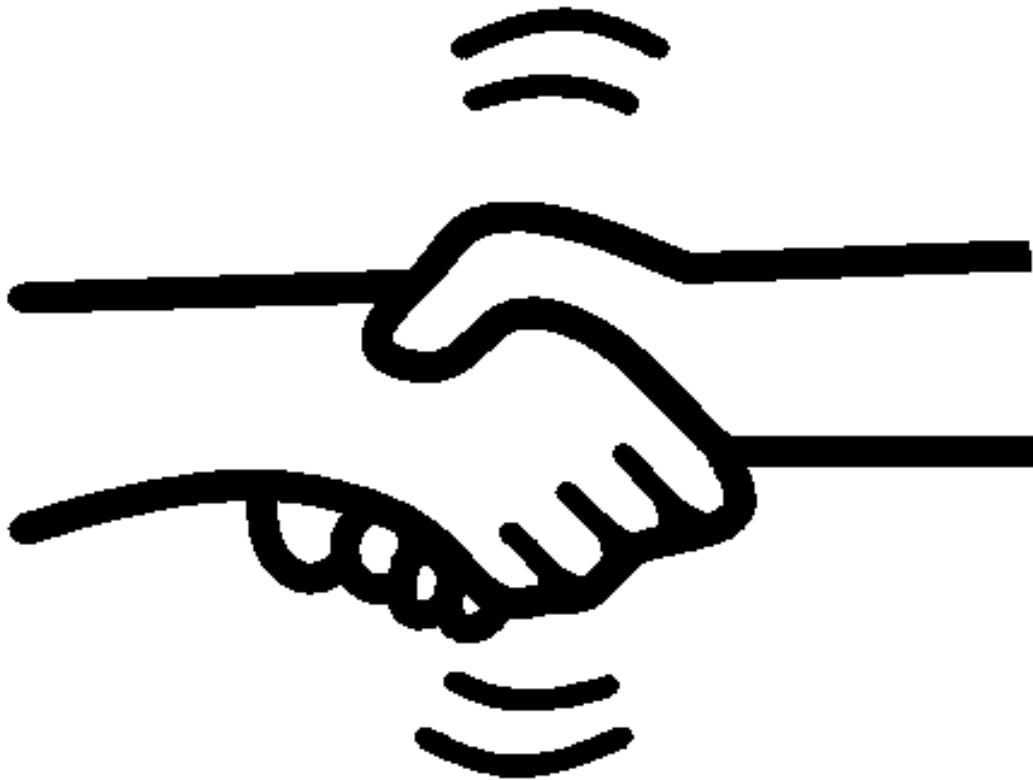
**Reconciliation** starts

what happened.



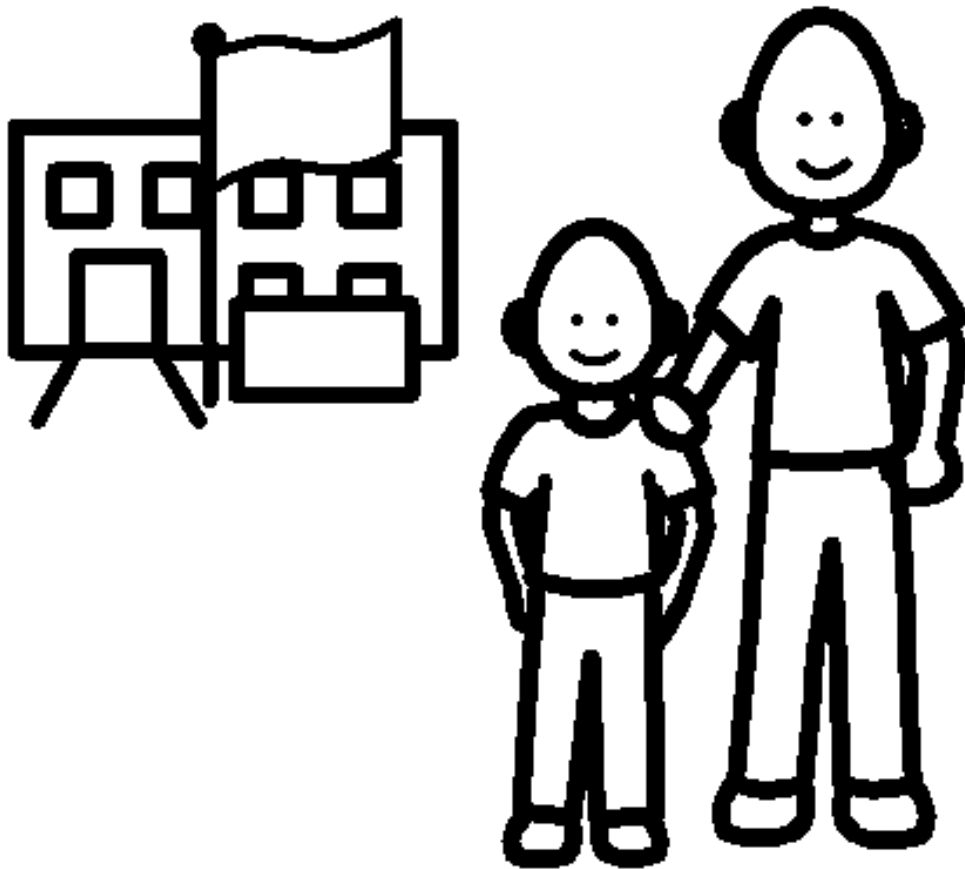

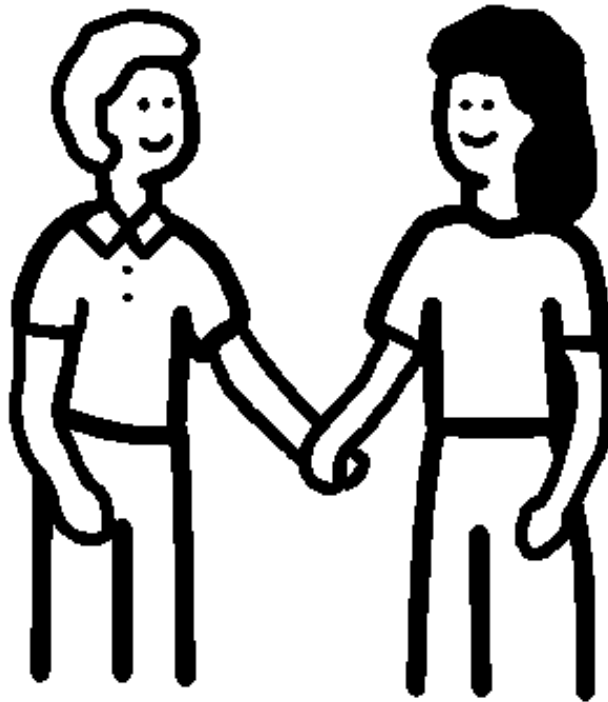




Reconciliation will take time. Indigenous people need to heal.

# Glossary:

**abuse:** repeatedly treating someone with cruelty or violence and causing them harm

**addiction:** relying on a substance or activity

**allies:** those who work with others for a common purpose

**assimilate:** to make people, ideas, and cultures the same as a certain societal group

**colonization:** when settlers take over political control of the land they arrived on

**culture:** ideas, customs, and behaviours of a group of people

**depression:** a state of mind whereby a person may feel low self-esteem, lack of energy, interrupted appetite and difficulty with sleep

**European:** a person that's from Europe

**identity:** the characteristics that make a person who they are

**impact:** to be affected by something

**Indigenous:** first peoples

**inferior:** to be considered lower in rank, status, or importance

**poverty:** being very poor

**racism:** treating people differently because of their race

**reconciliation:** understanding the truth of what happened, helping victims to heal, and creating better relationships moving forward

**residential school:** Indigenous children were sent to these government-run schools in Canada in an attempt to assimilate them

**settler:** a person who moved from their homeland to live somewhere else

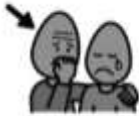
**survivors:** those who are still alive after a difficult life event

**trauma:** a difficult, stressful, emotional experience

**traditions:** customs and beliefs that are passed on from generation to generation

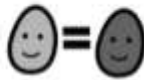

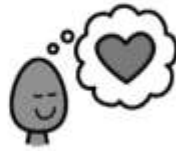
